THE SOCIETY TRAY - COMPETITION RULES

1. The Society Tray class is for a collection of three types of vegetables taken from the following list of eight. The quantity of each vegetable required for the collection is given in brackets: Carrots (3), cauliflowers (2), onions (3), parsnips (3), peas (6 pods), potatoes (3), runner beans (6 pods), and tomatoes (5). Each type of vegetable will be judged out of a total of 20 points. The overall mark will therefore be out of a total of 60.
2. All vegetables are to be displayed for effect. The vegetables must be displayed within an area measuring maximum 45 x 60 cm (18 x 24") without bending any part of them. No part of any exhibit may exceed the size of the tray. A tray or board measuring 45 x 60 cm (18 x 24") can be used to display the vegetables, or the area can simply be marked on the staging. Where a tray has a lip or edge, it is the internal measurements that must not exceed 45 x 60 cm (18 x 24").
3. A black cloth is permitted, and the tray may be painted. Parsley is allowed for garnishing. Plates, sand and rings, will be allowed. Onion tops may be tied or whipped using raffia. The Horticultural Show Handbook issued by RHS is available to view on request.



Notes for Exhibitors



- ∞ Carrots and parsnips must have foliage trimmed back to 3" (7.5 cm).
- ∞ Peas and beans must be displayed with some stalk attached.
- ∞ Tomatoes must be displayed with calyces (the green flower bud case).
- ∞ Judges may handle exhibits, open pods etc., to check the quality.
- ∞ Fruit should be exhibited with stalks/eyes attached

Special Note In the "Any other vegetable" and "Dish of any fruit" classes (classes 27 and 30) the following are the quantities required. For kinds not shown own discretion should be used (minimum of two).

Some guidance for beginners for showing flowers and vegetables:

- ∞ Freshness and uniformity count more than size, match items for colour and size as near as possible.
- ∞ When washing vegetables use a soft sponge or cloth – the skins of some vegetables are easily damaged.
- ∞ Carrots and beetroots should have about 3 in. of stalk left on and keep tapering roots intact.
- ∞ Tomatoes must be shown with calyx on with ripened unblemished skins.
- ∞ Peas and beans should have a little stalk left on and be full pods.
- ∞ Runner beans should be straight as possible combined with uniformity length and tenderness.
- ∞ Onion sets need to be as ripe as possible, roots cut off and tops trimmed and neatly tied (tying not essential). Rub off outer damaged skin only, do not over peel.
- ∞ Shallots show well stood on a bed of sand in the dish provided with same presentation as for onion sets.
- ∞ Flowers should be fresh, as free as possible from insect attack and good quality.



SECTION 4 FLORAL ARRANGEMENTS

Entry fee: 10p per class

***All classes eligible for Junior Award Of Merit
(up to and including 16 years – age to be stated on entry form)***

- ∞ Classes will be judged by NAFAS Competitions Manual 1st Edition 2001.
- ∞ Only one exhibit may be entered by an exhibitor in each class.
- ∞ No exhibitor shall substitute one entry for another.
- ∞ Staging will be provided by the Show Organisers.
- ∞ An exhibit is composed of natural plant material, with or without accessories, contained within a space as specified in a show schedule.
- ∞ Backgrounds, bases, containers, drapes, exhibit titles and mechanics may always be included in an exhibit, unless otherwise stated.
- ∞ More than one placement may always be included, unless otherwise stated.
- ∞ In all exhibits natural plant material must predominate.
- ∞ All classes (excluding class 86) to be staged on open tabling – approximate depth 75 cm.
- ∞ Tables will be covered in hessian.
- ∞ Exhibits may be staged from 6.30 a.m. to 10.00 a.m. on the day of the show in the marquee.

- ∞ Sloe Gin must be presented in a clear glass bottle with a new flanged cork. Bottles should be filled to within half an inch of the base of the cork. No sediment in bottle. Labels should state "Sloe Gin" and the month and year of making. Colour should be bright and aroma true to type. If you cannot get a flanged cork please contact us and we can provide.

Recipe for Mediterranean Scones:

350g self-raising flour	100g feta cheese cubed
1 tbsp baking powder	10 black olives, pitted and halved
¼ tsp salt	8 halves Sundried Tomatoes, chopped
50g butter, cut into pieces	300ml full fat milk
1 tbsp olive oil	1 egg to glaze

Heat the oven to 220C/fan 200C/gas 7. Butter a large baking sheet. In a large bowl, mix together the flour, baking powder and salt. Rub in the butter with the oil, until the mixture resembles fine crumbs, then add the tomatoes, cheese and olives. Make a well in the centre, pour in the milk and mix with a knife, using a cutting movement, until it becomes a soft 'stickyish' dough. (Use all the milk - it helps give a light texture.) Don't overhandle the dough. Flour your hands and the work surface well, and shape the dough into a round, about 3-4cm thick. Cut into eight wedges and place them well apart on the baking sheet. Brush with beaten egg and bake for 15-20 mins until risen, golden and springy to the touch. Transfer to a wire rack and cover with a clean tea towel to keep them soft. Will keep for 2-3 days in an airtight container.

Please note: The 2010 Schedule will include a Bottle of Rosehip Syrup.

This is a Hugh Fearnley-Whittingstall recipe – but please use your own if you have one

Rosehip syrup is dripping with vitamin C and has long had a reputation for keeping colds at bay all winter. Far from being austere, though, it has a surprisingly tropical tang, with notes of lychee and mango. Diluted with about five parts cold water, it makes a delicious cordial drink, which kids will love, and a fantastic autumn cocktail for grown-ups.

1kg rosehips, washed and chopped

1kg caster sugar

You will also need a jelly bag (or a clean cotton cloth and a big sieve)

Put two litres of water in a large pan and bring to the boil. Throw in the chopped rosehips, bring back to the boil, and then remove from the heat, cover and leave to infuse for half an hour, stirring from time to time. Strain the mixture through a jelly bag. (Alternatively, line a colander with a couple of layers of muslin and place over a large bowl. Tip in the rosehip mixture, and leave suspended over the bowl).



Set the strained juice aside and transfer the rosehip pulp back to the saucepan, along with another litre of boiling water. Bring to the boil, remove from the heat, infuse for another half an hour and strain as before. Discard the pulp and combine the two lots of strained juice in a clean pan. Bring to the boil, and boil until the volume has decreased by half. Remove from the heat.



Add the sugar and stir until dissolved. Return to the stove, bring to the boil and boil hard for five minutes. Pour into warmed, sterilised jars or bottles and seal.
